Statement of System of Internal Control 2021

The Louth and Meath Education and Training Board (LMETB) came into being on 1st July 2013 under the provisions of the Education and Training Boards Act 2013. On that date, LMETB took over the functions of the former County of Louth and County of Meath VECs. With effect from 1st July 2014, LMETB took over, from SOLAS, the assets, liabilities and the management of the activities of Dundalk Training Centre.

The Code of Governance for ETBs is set out in Circular Letter 002/2019, which was issued by the Department of Education to all ETBs in January 2019. The LMETB Board adopted this code at its meeting on 31st January 2019.

A new board was constituted for Louth and Meath ETB on 10 October 2019 and the board completed the appointment of new Finance and Audit and Risk Committees on the same date.

Responsibility for the System of Internal Control

As Chairperson of LMETB, I acknowledge the responsibility of the Board for ensuring that an efficient, effective system of internal control is maintained and operated. The system can only provide reasonable and not absolute assurance that assets are safeguarded, transactions are authorised and properly recorded, and that material errors or irregularities are either prevented or would be detected in a timely period.

Key Control Procedures

The Board has taken steps to ensure an appropriate control environment by:

- Clearly defining management and staff responsibilities
- Establishing procedures for reporting significant control failures and ensuring appropriate corrective actions;
- Establishing a formal risk management system involving procedures for identifying and evaluating all risks which could prevent LMETB achieving its objectives

The system of internal financial control operated in LMETB is based on:

- Detailed administrative procedures;
- · Segregation of duties;
- Specific authorisations;
- · Internal checks; and,
- Monthly management review of reports outlining the actual and budgeted results of programmes operated by LMETB.

The Board's Oversight Framework

The Board's monitoring and review of the effectiveness of the system of internal control is informed by the:

- The Chief Executive who has responsibility for the internal control framework.
- Recommendations made by the Office of the Comptroller and Auditor General in management letters or other reports;
- Work of the Audit and Risk Committee and the Finance Committee;

Audit and Risk Committee

The Board's oversight of the system of internal control is informed by the work of Audit and Risk Committee (ARC) which met four times in 2021. The work programme of the ARC included consideration of:

- Internal audit reports
- External audit reports and the management letters of the Comptroller and Auditor General (C & AG)
- Annual Financial Statements
- Risk Management Framework
- Risk Register
- Audit Register
- Compliance Audit Report
- Risk Management Reports from Director of Organisation Support and Development (DOSD)/Chief Risk Officer
- Opinion report to the board as to the adequacy and appropriateness of the systems of internal control

The executive attended meetings of the ARC by invitation and provided reports and updates on the operation of controls and risk management during 2021 as detailed in the ARC's reports to Board.

The Audit and Risk Committee reviewed the effectiveness of the system of internal controls for the relevant reporting period on 24th March 2022.

Finance Committee

The Board's oversight of the system of internal control is also informed by the work of the Finance Committee which met on six occasions during 2021: 19 February, 30 March, 24 June, 8 July, 13 October and 15 November. The work programme of the Finance Committee included consideration of:

- Annual Financial Statements 2021
- Recommendation to the Board of the 2021 Financial Statements
- Monthly Income and Expenditure Accounts
- Risk Management Reports from DOSD/Chief Risk Officer
- Recommendation to the Board of the Service Plan
- Review of implementation of the Service Plan

The Chief Executive, Director of OSD and Head of Finance reported to the Finance Committee in 2021.

The Finance Committee reviewed the Annual Financial Statements 2021 on 29th of March 2022 and recommended their adoption to the Board.

Internal Audit

An Internal Audit function is provided by the Internal Audit Unit – Education and Training Boards, who provide an overall opinion on areas audited.

The overall opinion is based on the findings identified during the audit and the range of possible opinions are as follows:

o Comprehensive – system of internal control is adequate and operates effectively

- Adequate system of internal control is generally adequate and operates effectively
- Inadequate system of internal control is inadequate and does not operate effectively

The following internal audit reviews were carried out in the period from the 01 January 2021 - 31 December 2021;

Internal audit report on Procurement fieldwork took place remotely in May, June and October 2020 and onsite in LMETB in September and October 2020 and dated 7 December 2021. The report was provided to the Audit and& Risk Committee on 17 December 2021. This internal audit opinion is based on information and controls in operation during the year ended 31st December 2019. Based on 2019 non-pay expenditure transactions provided by LMETB, a sample population was identified, from which a sample for testing was extracted. The overall finding of the report was that LMETB has a comprehensive system of internal control in place regarding procurement compliance. A total of 12 recommendations were made, 1 rated as high, 2 rated as medium and 9 rated as low. 9 have been implemented and 3 partially implemented.

Internal audit report on Policy Compliance in Louth and Meath was ETB carried out in November 2020 and April 2021 and dated 10 January 2022. The report was provided to the Audit and Risk Committee on 12 January 2022. The internal audit opinion is based on information and controls in operation during the period 1st January 2019 to 31st July 2020. The overall finding of the report was that LMETB has a comprehensive system of internal control in place regarding policy compliance. A total of 5 recommendations were made, 3 rated as medium and 2 rated as low. 5 have been partially implemented.

Fraud

No incidents were reported under LMETB's Fraud Policy in 2021.

Protected disclosures

LMETB received no protected disclosures in 2021 under the Protected Disclosure Act 2014.

Procurement

LMETB recorded a further reduction in non-compliant procurement in 2021. Nevertheless, fixed phone services to the value of approximately €0.14m procured in 2021 were not fully in accordance with national procurement guidelines. This figure is based on a review of expenditure undertaken across in excess of thirty individual schools and centres and represents 0.09% of total expenditure during the year.

Risk Management

LMETB has a Corporate Risk Management Register in place across the organisation. The Risk register was reviewed at each meeting of the Audit and Risk Committee in 2021 and the

Committee continues to monitor the development of the LMETB Strategic Risk Management Register. The LMETB Board approved a Risk Appetite Statement on 25 February 2021.

Issues progressing at sectoral level

Breaches of system internal control - Single Public Services Pension Scheme

Circular Letter 11/2014 obliges ETBs to provide benefits statements and calculations to members of the Single Public Services Pension Scheme by end of June 2014. LMETB did not meet its obligations to provide annual pension statements to all members of the Single Public Service Pension Scheme in 2021. However, statements are being provided to members where they request them individually and statements for staff members nearing retirement are being prioritised. This is an issue across the ETB sector and is being pursued at national level by the ESBS area of the Department of Education in conjunction with ETBI and individual ETBs. Due to resourcing issues with The Access Group, (including Covid-19 and staff leaving) development work which had commenced on the CoreHR System, with a view to bringing ETBs into compliance in relation to Superannuation Contributions, through full system compliance was not completed on schedule. However, a significant amount of work has been undertaken and there is ongoing correspondence with the Access Group and ESBS and testing of the new functionality being provided by Access Group is being conducted. This forms part of the overall Pensions Improvement Programme being implemented by the Department of Education and a dedicated team in ESBS has been put in place which is working solely on resolving Pension and Superannuation Contribution matters. The provision of accurate benefit statements to SPS pension scheme members is an integral part of the scope of this Pensions Improvement Programme.

Payroll Shared Services

The Education Shared Business Service (ESBS) has been established to deliver shared services in the Education sector. The migration of LMETB payroll for all staff took place in April 2020. The ESBS are responsible for the processing of the payroll while LMETB is still responsible for the issuing of instructions to shared services of the changes to payrolls and HR function. The Chief Executive has confirmed that he has fulfilled his responsibilities in relation to the requirements of both the Memorandum of Understanding, the Service Management Agreement and the Data Processing Agreements that have been signed and are in place between LMETB and the Department of Education - Education Shared Business Service (ESBS) centre. These documents provide the framework for the operation of ESBS-ETB Payroll Shared Services on behalf of the Education and Training Board (ETB) sector. The Chief Executive relies on a letter of assurance from the Accounting Officer of the Department of Education and Skills that the appropriate controls are exercised in the provision of payroll services by the ESBS to LMETB.

The Secretary General of the Department of Education provided a letter of Assurance for LMETB dated 18 February 2022 regarding internal control and audit arrangements for ESBS-ETB Payroll Shared Services (ESBS). ESBS facilitated the migration of payments to apprentices from an old legacy system which had been administered by SOLAS and which was end-of-life, with no effective mitigations that could be implemented due to the age of the system and the level of ongoing support available. The new system also fulfils all Revenue requirements regarding apprentices.

Migration of the final cohort of learners (Youthreach and VTOS) to move to this system is also now complete.

Finance Shared Services

The Education Shared Business Service (ESBS) has been established to deliver shared services in the Education sector. On the 1 July 2021 LMETB migrated part of its accounting function to a new financial management system which is already in use in other ETBs. LMETB was supported by ESBS to ensure a smooth transition.

Breaches of system internal control - Underpayment of VAT

An unprompted qualifying disclosure (UQD) was made to Revenue in 2020 regarding a VAT underpayment due to incorrect treatment of purchases from outside of Ireland. VAT was not calculated and paid to Revenue when the purchases were made. The Revenue accepted the UQD and the sum of €398,047 was paid in full settlement of the liability from 1 January 2019 to 31 December 2020. A letter was received from Revenue on 6th October 2021 confirming that the enquiry was concluded.

Covid-19 Pandemic

Teaching and learning took place remotely to the end of the 19/20 academic year and for a period from the start of 2021. Administrative staff have access to the LMETB network remotely and use Microsoft Teams to collaborate and hold meetings. Significant work has been done to mitigate the risk of a Covid 19 out-break on the reopening of schools and centres. LMETB complies with government advice and protocols.

LMETB is finalising works to address space and ventilation requirements in administration in a post pandemic world. Works in relation to signage, canteen changes, increasing the number of rooms in use and remedying issues are ongoing. A survey was issued to administration staff on 1 October 2021 to obtain the views of staff regarding remote working. LMETB will be mindful of legislation, national policy and circular and our own particular circumstances in making any decisions regarding remote working in a post pandemic world.

Under current public health regulations, a return to physical attendance in workplaces was permitted from Monday 24 January 2021. Administration staff were requested to return to the workplace on Monday 21st February 2022 in line with the recent Government announcement. Administration staff were advised that they could choose to return prior to that date on a phased basis if they thought it might assist them with the full return to the workplace and that flexi-time was re-activated on Monday 21st February 2022.

Public health advice and safety measures have resulted in fundamental and rapid changes to the working environment with remote and virtual working becoming the norm. New activities, reprioritisation of work and the ongoing need to deliver services have also impacted on LMETB's operations and staff. This environment gives rise to challenges for LMETB to ensure that effective internal controls are maintained. In the new environment, there have been changes to various components of the system of internal control, and it is important for the Board, its Committees and the executive to understand the impact of those changes when assessing the effectiveness of controls.

In analysing this impact LMETB has had regard to the reports of the executive on the changes caused to the system of internal control, the risks arising from these changes, the measures taken in response to those risks and the evidence of any impact on the effectiveness of the system of internal control. These are informed by the guidance notes issued by the Office of the Comptroller and Auditor General and the Department of Education regarding same. In particular, LMETB has had regard to issues raised in the document "OCAG insights: The impact of Covid-19 on your control environment" which was reviewed and reported on and was included in the suite of documents that have informed this report.

Annual Review of Controls

LMETB is committed to operating an efficient, effective and economic internal control system. I confirm that the Audit and Risk Committee, at its meeting on 24th March 2022, conducted a review of the effectiveness of the system of internal financial control for year ended 31 December 2021 in the manner prescribed by the Code of Practice for the Governance of Education & Training Boards.

This Audit and Risk Committee's review considered:

- Confirmation from the Chief Executive that the system of internal control is adequate and appropriate insofar as is reasonably practicable. The Chief Executive included information gathered from senior managers across the organisation in arriving at this conclusion
- A review of internal and external audit reports issued in 2021, and to date in 2022.
- Meetings with representatives from the C&AG and the IAU-ETB.
- An examination of minutes of meetings of the Board and Finance Committee to ensure
 there are no inconsistencies with the assessment of internal control provided to the
 Audit and Risk Committee in Internal Audit Reports and Management
 representations.
- A review of Governance and Control activities in 2021 including:
 - Engagement between the Audit and Risk Committee, Finance Committee, Board and the executive.
 - Reports from the Chief Executive, Director of Organisation Support and Development (OSD), Director of Schools and Director of Further Education and Training (FET) to the Board.
 - Reports from the Executive to the Audit and Risk Committee.
 - Recommendations made by the C & AG in management letters or other reports.
 - Recommendations made by the Internal Audit Unit.

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- Risk Management Reports from DOSD/Chief Risk Officer.
- The Risk Register that is kept up-to-date and presented to the Audit Committee on a regular basis.

The Audit and Risk Committee presented a report on the review of controls to the Board on 24th March 2022.

The Board reviewed and approved this statement at its meeting held on 31st of March 2022.

Louth and Meath Education and Training Board Notes to The Financial Statements - Year Ended 31 December 2021

1 Accounting Policies

1.1 Significant Accounting Policies

The basis of accounting and significant accounting policies adopted by Louth and Meath ETB are set out below. They have been applied consistently throughout the year and the preceding year.

1.2 General Information

Louth and Meath Education and Training Board was established on 1 July 2013 and its functions are set out in section 10 of the Education and Training Boards Act 2013.

Community National Schools came under the Patronage of the ETB with the commencement of the 2017/2018 academic year.

1.3 (a) Basis of Presentation

The financial statements are presented in the form approved by the Minister for Education and Skills with the consent of the Minister for Finance and the Minister for Public Expenditure and Reform. They consist of a Statement of Accounting Policies, an Operating Statement, a Statement of Current Assets and Current Liabilities and notes to the financial statements.

Where necessary, the comparative figures for the previous year have been restated on the same bases as those for the current year.

(b) Revenue and Expenditure Recognition

Revenue

Oireachtas grants and other grants are recognised on a cash basis.

Other receipts are recognised on a cash basis.

Expenditure

Pay

Pay expenditure is recognised on a cash basis. Pay represents renumeration to employees including ER PRSI.

Non Pay

Non Pay expenditure is recognised on a cash basis. Non pay expenditure is comprised of administration and operational expenses.

Allowances

Allowance expenditure is recognised on a cash basis. Allowances are paid to learners who are undertaking specified further education and training programmes funded by SOLAS.

The Operating Statement is presented by cash receipts and cash payments per programme grouping. The cash surplus / (deficit) is adjusted for movement in Current Assets (excl. Bank) and Current Liabilities to give an overall result for the year on an accrual basis.

(c) Asset and Liabilities Recognition

The Statement of Current Assets and Current Liabilities is prepared on the accruals basis by determining state grant and other funder balances at amounts that reflect the related receipts received and expenditure incurred and in accordance with the funding rules.

Recurrent State Grants

These grants constitute the core funding to the Education and Training Board.

Capital Grants

These grants are used to meet building, infrastructure, property acquisitions and refurbishment costs, and in specified circumstances may be used to fund fixtures, fittings, equipment and furniture.

Other Recurrent Income

Agency and Self - financing Projects

Agency work involves running a programme on behalf of another organisation or students

according to agreed criteria and the Board is reimbursed its cost.

Self - financing Projects are programmes run under the complete control of the Board either for the Board or other organisations.

Third Party Debtors are included in Current Assets.

Pay and Expense Liabilities are included in Current Liabilities.

Comparatives

Where necessary, the comparative figures for the previous year have been restated on the same basis as those for the current year.

1 Accounting Policies (continued)

(d) Tangible fixed assets

All tangible fixed assets purchased including building, infrastructure, property acquisitions, refurbishment costs, fixtures, fittings, equipment and furniture are expensed in the year of purchase. State grants to fund the purchase of tangible fixed assets are recognised in the same year.

All consumable stocks are expensed as purchased.

(f) Superannuation

The pension entitlements of ETB staff, including those who transferred from SOLAS, are conferred under defined benefit schemes. Staff employed since 2013 are included in the Single Public Service Pension Scheme and monthly payments are made to the Department of Public Expenditure and Reform.

Superannuation deductions made from employees pay in respect of the schemes are retained by the ETB as part of agreed Exchequer funding, or paid over to the Department of Public Expenditure and Reform.

The ETB does not make any contributions towards the schemes.

These unfunded schemes are operated on a pay as you go basis with the annual pension entitlements being paid directly by the National Shared Services Office on behalf of the ETB. ETBs are responsible for the administration of their pensions. Pension funds are provided by the Department of Education .

Provision has not been made in the financial statements for the present cost of the future benefits that have accrued to staff members and existing pensioners under these schemes.

34 Additional Superannuation Contribution

The ETB does not make pension contributions in respect of employees. Since 2013 all new entrants are obliged to join the Single Public Pension Scheme.

From 1 January 2019 onwards, members of public service defined benefit pension schemes pay an additional superannuation contribution (ASC) arising from the Public Service Stability Agreement (2018-2020) and the Public Service Pay and Pensions Act 2017.

ASC is a permanent contribution in respect of pensionable remuneration.

40 The impact of COVID 19

The COVID 19 pandemic developed rapidly in 2020 and its impact has continued throughout 2021. Measures taken by our government to contain the virus continued affect how we operate. Louth and Meath ETB has taken a range of measures to monitor and mitigate the effects of COVID 19 including putting in place required safety and public health measures for our staff such as social distancing and working from home. Notwithstanding the impact of COVID 19, Louth and Meath ETB continues to carry out its vital role in education and training with a focus on ensuring continuity of education for learners, including a particular focus on more vulnerable students.

Since March 2020 the pandemic has had a financial implications for Louth and Meath ETB and we have received additional resources in the form of government grants to assist us in continuing in our role.

The additional costs incurred were partially offset by savings in the areas of

- · Substitution costs,
- Travel and subsistence
- Consumables and costs incurred for contract management services and
- Savings associated with the delivery of Further Education and Training provision, including apprenticeships, where allowances would normally be paid to learners but where prolonged centre closures meant some classes did not take place as scheduled and there was a drop in learner payments.

On 15/10/2021, Louth and Meath ETB refunded the Department of Education unspent COVID 19 funding of €451,777.

Louth and Meath ETB has taken the following steps to manage and mitigate the effects of the pandemic on its operation

- Louth and Meath ETB engaged its business continuity plan to ensure that its operations continued as normal in line with it regulatory requirements.
- · The Audit and Risk Committee reviewed the updated risk register to take account of the specific risks arising from COVID 19 and Louth and Meath ETB developed and implemented additional control measures as required.
- The Departments of Education and Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science of Education put in place a range of steering and engagement structures to support the education and training system in navigating the challenges of COVID-19. Louth and Meath ETB is participating in these structures to ensure a joined-up approach across the education sector.

In 2022 we will continue to follow the various government policies and advice and, in parallel, we will do our utmost to continue our

vital role in the best and safest way possible. Within the further education and training sector, ETBs will continue to play an important role in the response to upskilling and reskilling those adversely impacted by the pandemic.
